International Day of People with Disability



The 2023 International Day of People with Disability marked a significant milestone for LETR Victoria. Our team engaged in various activities, starting with a Torch Run through Melbourne's streets, followed by an eventful gathering at the Academy in Glen Waverley and a visit to the Spencer St headquarters of the Public Order Response Team (PORT).

Chief Commissioner Shane Patton, alongside athletes, LETR members, and Special Olympics Australia CEO Pierre Comis, led the run through the city, culminating at Southbank for the annual Victorian Disability Sport and Recreation Festival.

The morning reached new heights when the Chief Commissioner presented SOA with a fundraising cheque totalling a record-breaking \$272,350.

The Academy Torch Run surpassed all previous records, hosting the largest Torch Run in Victoria's history. Over 200 police recruits participated, immersing themselves in the LETR spirit as athletes led the charge around the academy's athletics track.

Assistant Commissioner Tim Hansen extended a warm welcome to the athletes, while Torch Run Ambassador Acting Deputy Commissioner Lauren Callaway ignited the Flame of Hope. The day featured 12 Chief Challenges, including a visit to PORT, offering athletes a glimpse into the command centre and friendly competitions like a push-up challenge.







International Conference

In October last year, a record 13 LETR Australia members gathered in Chicago for the 11th annual Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics International Conference. Hosted by LETR Illinois, the conference recognized LETR Victoria for its outstanding fundraising efforts, with President Matt Volk expressing motivation to continue the momentum.

The conference also celebrated LETR's global impact, surpassing \$1 billion in fundraising since 1981. Aussies braved freezing temperatures for a Torch Run around Chicago's harbor and toured the Michigan Unified Sports and Inclusion Centre. The event bid farewell to Victoria's athlete representative Chelsea and Chair of the LETR IEC, former NSW detective Scott Whyte, recognizing their contributions.





Awards

LETR's dedication received national and local recognition. LETR Oceania (Australia/New Zealand) - LETR's national umbrella body - received the "Champions of Inclusion" award at the Special Olympics Australia Gala, with LETR Victoria's Nicole Beale representing with pride.

While we do what we do for our fabulous athletes, it was a thrill and incredibly moving to be recognised and acknowledged for that work especially on the national stage.

At the state level, Kate Lockyer and Rachael Kelly were honoured by the Office of Public Advocate for their exceptional service to athletes with intellectual disabilities. Kate received the Outstanding Service Excellence to People with a Disability Award, while Rachael received a commendation for her dedication and mentoring.





Club Events

LETR remained active in Special Olympics sports events. President Matt Volk joined local police and 80 bowlers for a Ten Pin bowling tournament in November, while September saw basketballers from across Victoria compete in an inter-club tournament hosted by Melbourne Eastern Ranges. Laureina and Rachael led Victorian Special Olympics golfers to the Gold Coast, achieving a commendable fourth place.

Our "Water Rats" kept their head above water coming a respectable fifth out of eight on the corporate ladder but unable to top McGrathNicol who took out the Champions trophy.










